April SIAS Program Highlights: Our forth Zoom program featured Dr. Mike Ward speaking on the Conservation and Management of Migratory Birds. Dr. Ward covered a variety of species and their migratory habits but what they all seemed to have in common as per Dr. Ward, is that they won't make an extended flight, like a flight over the Gulf of Mexico, without enough stored body fat and supporting weather conditions.

Under adequate body fat stores and with favorable weather, the trip is not too much trouble for them. The birds tracked, flew from Ft. Morgan, Alabama across the Gulf of Mexico to the north shore of the Yucatan Peninsula. Rubythroated hummingbirds were found to prefer a route south along the Gulf Coast of Texas. They can tank up at hummingbird feeders along that route.

Another interesting behavior had to do with Canada geese. It seems they are choosing to overwinter further north than in the past. They are using the roofs of big box stores for warmth so that they can avoid flying to warmer south ern areas where they are hunted. Smart birds!

When asked about the current Bird Flu and its relationship to feeding birds, Dr. Ward stated that bird species that visit feeders are not susceptible to the virus. Likewise, for hummingbirds. He added that he would be leaving his bird feeders out.

New Firefly Species in the Cache

June 3, 7:30-9 p.m., at Heron Pond Preserve

The cypress firefly, lightening bug, (Photuris walldoxeyi) was
first documented in early 2019 in high-quality cypress swamps
in Mississippi, Tennessee and Indiana. A confirmed Illinois
sighting was recorded at the Heron Pond boardwalk in June
2019. Natural heritage biologist Christina Feng will tell us
about fireflies of Illinois while leading a night hike on the Todd
Fink-Heron Pond Trail to the Heron Pond boardwalk in search
of the cypress firefly. For more details and to reserve your

Monarchs and 26 Other Species Closer to Protection

After three lawsuits, the Center for Biological Diversity just secured an agreement on dozens of species from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service — the agency committed to making decisions on whether 18 plants and animals should be granted the protection of the Endangered Species Act and will also decide whether to identify critical habitat for nine other species.

Those whose survival is at stake include monarch butterflies, tricolored bats, eastern gopher tortoises, western pond turtles, black-capped petrels, Bethany Beach fireflies, Las Vegas bearpoppies, and Mojave poppy bees.

"I'm so glad these 27 species are finally getting a shot at avoiding extinction," said Noah Greenwald, the Center's endangered species director. "It's incredibly frustrating that some of these animals and plants have waited decades for help."

Twenty-one of the species will see protection decisions by the end of fiscal year 2022. https://www.biologicaldiversity.org/

Birding Blitz = Big Success! A Big THANK YOU to everyone who either participated in or pledged to the 2022 Birding Blitz. Because of all of you, it was an overwhelming success. This year, as of this writing, we raised \$3,845.75 in pledges for the Cache River Wetlands. A standing ovation goes to the BirdPoCaLyPse Now team of Kimberly Rohling, Katy Banning, and Tony Dynek for collecting \$1,611 of that total. When the bird lists were all put together, 202 bird species had been seen in that one day. The overall winning was the SI Hotshots (Keith McMullen, Colin Dobson, Dan Kassebaum and Trevor Slovick) in the Open A true Big Day category with a total of 175 species, thought to be a blitz record. The Senior team winners were The Ancient Mariners team of Cathie Hutcheson, Nancy Garwood, and Joe Merkelbach with 118 species. The Oakwood Bottoms Boys team of Jacob Cooper, Zach Skubiszewski, and Ryan Fuller with 139 species won the county category. The Whip-poor-Wells, Nick and Kyle Wells, won the Open B with 122. The other competitors were: Judy Vickery and Ryan Jones (The Vagrants) with 152 species and Kimberly Rohling, Katy Banning,

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and Tony Dynek (BirdPoCalyPse Now) with 157 species both in Open A. three other teams in the Senior category were Nelda Hinckley and Joanna Christopher (Team NJ) with 30 species, Theresa Madel and Donald Toutant (Maximum Drive) with 60 species, and Aimee Hemphill, Sam Spiller, and Kathy Belletire (The Bluebirds of Happiness) with 87 species that included a white-tailed kite! The teams of Craig Taylor and Steve Bailey (The County Hunters) with 128 species and Vicki Lang, Mark Vukovich, and Rhonda Rothrock (the Cocoa-billed Cuckoos) with 127 species competed in the County category.

The awards brunch was held At the Haven on Crab Orchard Lake. Everyone agreed that it is a lovely place and we should use it again in 2023. -Rhonda R.
