The Hellbender - A Journey in Saving a Declining Ozark Highland Salamander will be the subject of a ZOOM presentation by Dr. Jeffrey Briggler, state herpetologist with the Missouri Dept. of Conservation for SIAS on Friday, April 28th, starting at 7 p.m. Dr. Briggler will discuss a review of the recovery actions occurring to save this endangered salamander.

And Dr. Briggler and a hellbender recently made the St. Louis Post Dispatch - Apr. 13, 2023: "First Ozark hellbender raised in captivity, at the St. Louis Zoo, reproduces in the wild"

A male hellbender raised at the St. Louis Zoo has successfully reproduced in Missouri's Current River, a first and a significant milestone for the species, zoo and Missouri Dept. of Conservation officials announced. Fewer than 1,000 Ozark hellbenders exist in the world, and the large aquatic salamander was added to the federal endangered species list in October 2011. This particular hellbender started its life in fall 2013 in a natural nest of eggs in the Current River. Missouri Dept. of Conservation and Natural Park Service staff collected the nest and took it to the St. Louis Zoo, where the eggs were hatched and raised. Dr. Briggler grew up in Morrilton, Arkansas, and received his Bachelor of Science from the University of Central Arkansas-Conway. He later received both his master's and doctoral degrees from University of Arkansas-Fayetteville with a focus on pond and cave breeding amphibians of the Ozarks and Ouachita Mountains in Arkansas. Since the summer of 2000, he has served as state herpetologist for the Missouri Dept. of Conservation.

He spends the majority of his time promoting, conserving, and

monitoring amphibian and reptile populations throughout Missouri. Dr. Briggler is heavily involved with numerous state and national herpetological organizations. He has published over 70 scientific manuscripts, written numerous educational publications, and has appeared on many national and international television and radio broadcasts. For his work on hellbenders, he received the 2012 Saint Louis Zoo Conservation Award and the 2014 PARC Allison Haskell Award for excellence in herpetofaunal conservation. Dr. Briggler and his family reside on the family farm in Callaway County.

March Meeting Highlights Dr. Pease's program detailed bird surveys being conducted by his students at SIUC and taking place throughout IL. As I found it hard to adequately recap his presentation, most of the info that follows is from his PeaseLab website.

Their southern Illinois bird monitoring project seeks to document the presence/absence of bird species throughout southern Illinois using Autonomous Recording Units (ARUs). (These ARUs are recording devices about the size of a saltine cracker.) During May - July 2022, they deployed these sound recording devices at over 150 different locations spanning the 11 southernmost IL counties, resulting in over 2 Terabytes (about half a million minutes) of recordings. Site locations were selected using the block-grid sampling method utilized by the Illinois Breeding Bird Atlas compiled by Vern Kleen, et al. and released in 2004. Since when the Illinois Breeding Bird Atlas (IBBA) documented the ranges and populations of bird species throughout the entirety of Illinois, with observations spanning 1986 through 1991, no effort comparable has been made on a state-wide scale in Illinois to survey bird species distributions and populations. The Pease team hopes to survey the state of Illinois using the same block-grid sampling method as the IBBA while instead relying on ARUs for data collection, BirdNET Analyzer (a deep artificial neural network) for producing a list of all species possibly present on each recording based on the audio spectrogram, and manual validation by students to ensure correct species ID by BirdNET Analyzer. Dr. Pease and his team are looking for residents who would be willing to allow monitoring recorders to be placed on their property. Biden-Harris Administration Announces New Steps for Climate Resilience and Forest Conservation

WASHINGTON, April 20, 2023 – In anticipation of the upcoming Earth Day celebrations, the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture (USDA) and the Dept. of the Interior (DOI) announced actions to foster forest conservation, enhance forest resilience to climate change, and inform policymaking on ensuring healthy forests on federally managed lands administered by the USDA Forest Service and the DOI's Bureau of Land Management (BLM).

To support these actions, USDA and DOI worked together to develop several reports, as directed by President Biden's Executive Order on Strengthening the Nation's Forests, Communities, and Local Economies (E.O. 14072), which he signed on Earth Day 2022. The Executive Order calls for inventorying mature and old-growth forests, setting reforestation targets on federally managed lands, and analyzing reforestation opportunities on state, Tribal and private lands. In addition, the Forest Service is releasing a new tool that illustrates the risks and vulnerabilities of climate change across the landscape along with a call for public input on how national forests and grasslands should be managed for climate resilience.

Newly Released Joint Reports on Forest Conservation

The Mature and <u>Old-Growth Forest report</u> defines what mature and old growth forests are, establishes the first-ever initial inventory of those forests, and shows their distribution across lands managed by the USDA Forest Service and the Dept. Of the Interior's Bureau of Land Management. The initial inventory identified more than 32 million acres of old-growth and around 80 million acres of mature forest across 200 types of forests. The initial inventory found that old-growth forest represents 18% and mature forest another 45% of all forested land managed by the two agencies. Recognizing the many values of mature and old-growth forests, both agencies conducted significant outreach to gather public input from communities, tribes, scientists, and agency professionals in the report's development.

Like all the nation's forests, mature and old-growth forests are threatened by climate change and associated stressors. The initial inventory and definitions for mature and old-growth forests are part of an overarching climate-informed strategy to help retain carbon, reduce wildfire risk, and address climate-related impacts, including increased insects and disease.

As directed in President Biden's Executive Order and laid out in the report, the USDA Forest Service and the Interior Dept's Bureau of Land Management will use these definitions and initial inventory to continue to refine results, assess threats to old growth and mature forest stands, and conduct public engagement. In the near future, the USDA and DOI BLM also plan to incorporate information gathered from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's (NASA) Global Ecosystem Dynamics Investigation mission, which will provide forest inventory and analysis plots using space-based laser measurements. These efforts will help the agencies meet the science-based approach required in the executive order as well as develop management policy and strategies to recruit, sustain, and restore mature and old-growth forests. Based on that number, the Shawnee National Forest ranks equal to the 26th most visited of the 63 (true) National Park units and 76 out of all 424 National Park units. https://irma.nps.gov/Stats/SSRSReports/National Reports/Annual Park Ranking Report (1979 - Last Calendar Year)

-Many organizations respect and enthusiastically work with the US Forest Service in the Shawnee. Groups including The Shawnee Trails Conservancy, the Shawnee Group of the Sierra Club, and The Friends of the Shawnee all regularly put in their time and energies assisting employees of the Shawnee National Forest with projects such as trail maintenance, invasive plant species eradication, and trash round-ups.

-With regard to a National Park for Illinois, efforts are underway to get Cahokia Mounds designated a unit of the National Park System. In 2016, a study that took 2 years to complete found that Cahokia met all criteria. We are still waiting for that designation to occur.
